With life turned upside down this past year, like many organisations, we've had to flex, change, and embrace new technology. We've redeployed staff and run our services and facilities differently this past year to ensure that the town has been protected and our community looked after.

We have:

- Kept our market open to enable residents to shop outside in a Covid secure environment
- Worked with the Borough Council, as part of The Wokingham Community Response alongside Citizens Advice, the voluntary sector, Volunteer Centre, police and other partners to ensure all residents had access to the help they needed and the town was as safe as reasonably possible

A chat with Cllr Tony Lack Sharing moments from his Mayoral year 2020/21

We also have wonderful events in Wokingham that we have sadly missed this past year. The Fireworks, May Fayre, Winter Carnival and Street Concert all bring the community together and, being ex-military, our Remembrance parades and services are very important to me.

What are your passions or hobbies?

Moving towards a **Sustainable Future**

We've spent some time developing a sustainability action plan to take us through to 2023. Many actions will be in partnership with other organisations so that we support projects that have a big impact on our community or work towards other regional and national initiatives. Other activities will focus on improving our own environmental credentials, enhancing and protecting the town environment, and working with you wherever possible to influence change.

We're making a start and hope you will join us on the journey.

Waste and Recycling

So far we have:

- Improved recycling within the Town Hall and at events
- Reduced printed marketing materials for events
- Begun working towards a • more sustainable market: encouraging traders to use sustainable and recyclable materials, and asking that they use more sustainable suppliers





Water and Energy

So far we have:

- Switched all Christmas lights to LED and worked with a supplier who can recondition, repurpose and recycle all lights and materials used
- Reduced the carbon footprint of Woosehill Community Centre by installing LED lighting, and are currently investigating insulation and solar energy options

Improving the Environment

So far we have:

- Worked with partners Wokingham District Veteran Tree Association and Wokingham Society to bring two new elm trees to Elms Field
- Planted new lime trees and launched a trial to • recondition the soil, protecting mature lime trees on Langborough Recreation Ground. To ensure they continue to be a feature within the park for years to come
- Begun rewilding areas within our parks to create pollinator friendly environments
- Provided funding for and coordinating Wokingham In Bloom to support: pollinator friendly planting, 'grow your own' initiatives, edible planting, hanging baskets and environmental and wildlife projects across the town
- Allocated £10k to plant semi-mature trees within WTC's parks and open spaces

- Agreed new 'sustainability' planning criteria for use on planning applications, to ensure we consider more accessible and sustainable options, in line with Wokingham Borough Council's Climate Emergency Policy
- Worked with event partners to continue to find ways to improve recycling and energy use, reduce waste, and encourage sustainable travel at our events.

Our Parks and Green Spaces

Our parks and green spaces have always been important to us as a Council. This year has seen unprecedented use and after the first lockdown we were determined to keep these spaces clean and open for all the community. To ensure all our play parks continue to thrive and can be enjoyed by all, we've established a 10-year investment plan. This covers the addition of new age-appropriate equipment and total refurbishments of play parks within the town on a cyclical basis.

This coming year will see the play park in King George V refurbished. Thank you to local residents and park users who've helped us create a list of ideas, likes and dislikes. We've now gone out to tender, with play park companies expected to design a new inclusive play scheme that fits the brief. We'll be sharing designs and timelines with you as soon as we are able.



Maintenance is ongoing on the beautiful lime walk at Langborough Recreation Ground. The lime trees are suffering as a result of climate change so we've been working with contractors to recondition the soil, plant replacement trees where necessary and generally ensure that the trees remain a feature within the park for years to come.

We are also setting aside areas within our parks to support Wokingham in Bloom and local sustainability initiatives.

We'll be planting new trees, wild flowers, herbs, edible plants and fruit trees in appropriate parks.


Allotments


Platinum Jubilee
